This image over Orton Church has been professionally produced and gives a reasonable impression of what the proposal could actually look like. The size of the turbine, 67 metres (over 200 feet), means that it will impact over a wide area. Unfortunately it is not until development has taken place that you realise a favourite view is affected (like this over Orton Church) by which time it is of course too late. So please make sure you object as soon as possible.

Re: Application 13/0917 Turbine Raisgill Hall, Orton

I understand an application has been made for a wind turbine between the villages of Orton and Tebay.

The size of the turbine (67m) will mean that it impacts over a wide area of outstandingly beautiful landscape which experts agree is of National Park quality. It will be highly visible from the high peaks of the Howgills which form part of the Dales National Park and much of the Orton Fells. All areas now increasingly used for recreational purposes.

Areas such as this should be regarded as valuable National assets and it is important that landscapes of this quality are kept free from damaging industrial developments of this nature.

The development would also be highly visible from the communities of Gaisgill, Raisbeck, Tebay and to a lesser extent Orton.

The proposal will achieve virtually nothing to further government emissions targets and impose costs on local communities and areas of outstanding countryside considered of National Park status.
